Following the flag raising event, the children returned to school for an afternoon of traditional games. The weather was perfect for the day and the children's behaviour was exemplary. I should pass on a special thanks to the children in Y6, who were so helpful and sensible in helping to get the equipment organized for the day. Kestrels, you were absolute stars today.

Having mentioned today's weather, I thought it might be helpful to provide a reminder about our recommendations for children in warmer weather. We are hoping for some lovely summer weather next term and we will be reminding the children about all those 'sun safe' messages. We encourage children to wear sun hats when they are outside and will encourage them to drink regularly throughout the day. Water is always readily available to the children. They can refill their drinks bottles in the wet area and jugs of water are put out for the children every lunch time. We also encourage children to wear sunscreen. If your child needs to reapply sunscreen at lunch time, we are happy for them to do that. Please send in a labelled bottle/tube of sunscreen for this purpose. During the summer term, we tend to spend more time outside so want the children to be prepared for warmer conditions.

I hope you all manage to have a lovely half-term break, enjoying time with friends and family. We look forward to seeing everyone back in school, on Monday 6th June.

Please could we ask you to help us by booking your child's lunch via ParentPay before the 8am cut off each day.



Masjid E Noor Mosque

They also got the chance to dress up in Muslim clothing and took part in wudu - the ceremonial cleansing of hands, face, head, arms and feet before prayer.











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Krishna Mandir Temple

On Tuesday 3 May Year 3 and Year 4 children were lucky enough to be given permission to visit the Krishna Mandir Hindu Temple in Cheltenham as part of the

religious visits programme at Hope Brook. It was fascinating to watch their daily worship. We observed the temple using a Puja Tray and honouring the Hindu dieties. It was very different to our own worship at school.





Gloucester Cathedral

On Monday 16th May Kestrels class went to Gloucester Cathedral. They were looking at the links between places and objects in the building to British Values: democracy, tolerance of others, individual liberty, rule of law and mutual respect for other religions and beliefs. Some examples written about by Keelan Coleman:

INDIVIDUAL LIBERTY - The pulpit showed individual liberty because people were allowed to speak their mind in front of everyone no matter what it was. They were also allowed to pray in it, showing people were free to speak and pray - this is what individual liberty means, free to speak and do.

TOLERANCE -The memorial dedicated to Sir George Onesiphorus Paul represented tolerance because he visited Gloucester prison and saw how poorly the prisoners were being treated - if one of the prisoners had fallen ill they were not taken care of. Also the food they were given was revolting and sickly; he paid for

hospitals, better food and chapels in the prison. So, that meant even if people did bad things, Sir George was still tolerant of them.



After lunch at the cathedral and a VERY heavy thunder storm they began a historic tour of Gloucester. They looked at the monk's gardens behind the cathedral then walked up to view the Beatrix Potter museum. They walked to the Roman remains outside of Boots – Eastgate viewing chamber and then made their way back around Greyfriar's Priory (Franciscan House founded 1231 – only example in country). After that they made their way down towards the Gloucester Docks to view the Tall Ships, then around Llanthony Secunda Priory (Augustan Priory, 15th century tythe barn and medieval storage buildings) and then into the gardens. On the way back they looked at Robert Raikes house, now a pub (Sunday school pioneer and who started Crypt school) and St Mary de Crypt (Famous for its Tudor school room) and then finally the old chiming Bell and Baker's clock – above the beautifully preserved Edwardian shop front built in 1904. The bells are struck on the quarter hour by the figures of Old Father Time, John Bull and other characters representing Ireland, Scotland and Wales). They then made their way back to the bus and returned back to school.

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Cotswold Wildlife Park

On Friday 20 May children in Robins and Woodpeckers visited the Cotswold Wildlife Park.

Woodpeckers and Robins both had a great day. We saw lots of animals including giraffes, rhinos and even a red panda. Year 1 and Year 2 really enjoyed their talks from the zoo keepers and we also got to see some of the animals being fed. It was amazing seeing some of our favourite animals in real life and learn more facts about them. We're excited to use what we have found out in class for the rest of this term.

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Ashmolean Museum
