## Safety Notice



Please could we remind parents to be good role models by using paths and not walking on the driveway or cutting across the car park at school. The bend on our driveway is a blind spot for drivers and can be particularly risky for children and adults leaving Pippins. Using the paths is the safest practice. The children have been reminded that they should walk in and out of school, staying with their parents. We

would also like to remind parents that there should be no parents' cars on site between 8.30am and 4.30pm. Thank you for helping us keep your children safe.

#### Lateness

Our school day starts promptly at 8.45am. Whilst we appreciate that the majority of children arrive before this time, any children who are late arriving can miss out on the first task of the day, and often unsettle the class as a result. Lateness after the registers are taken is classed by the Department for Education as unauthorised absence.

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# Kestrels Trip to London

On Friday 22 September, Kingfishers and Kestrels departed at 6.30am for a day trip to London. Everyone was tired but excited for the trip.

Kestrels went to the London Eye first and waited patiently in the queue. There were amazing views from each corner of the pods. When we got off, we found a place to sit down and ate our lunch. The pigeons kept surrounding us but I didn't mind as

long as they didn't eat my food! There was a street performer who was playing a lot of Ed Sheeran songs. After lunch we had time to play in the park which was fun!

We also went on a river cruise on the Thames. Our guide was called Rose and she was helpful and funny. We saw multiple bridges like the 'wonky bridge', the Shard, the Bolt, the London Eye and HMS Belfast that is now a museum. One of the best things we saw was Tower Bridge - it is really tall and when we went under it we waved to the people on the bridge. Rose told us that the Thames is actually one of the cleanest rivers. She said that "if you take some river water home and let it settle that it would turn in to clean, clear water". I found this fact amazing and was tempted to do so.



After that we stopped to sketch the Elizabeth Tower (Big Ben is the bell inside it) and then had some time to play in the park. One of my favourite things was the ice-cream that I bought.

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# Kingfishers Trip to The Tower of London

Before Kingfishers could leave the coach to go to The Tower of London, we dropped off Kestrels at the London Eye. The coach then made its way to the car park to drop us off -we walked to the ticket office where we collected our wrist bands.

We all walked into The Tower of London and found a place to sit and eat our lunches. After we finished, we made our way to meet up with an actress who had dressed up as Catherine Parr. She told us about all of King Henry VIII's wives at the time. The actress pretended that it was 1599 and King Henry had proposed to her. Whilst we



were having a discussion about the wives, the actress led us to the place where Ann Boleyn and Katherine Howard were beheaded.

After we had our tour, we went to see the Crown Jewels. We saw the King's Royal Guards. When they are on duty, sometimes they march and shout. It's quite hard to understand what they say as the strap on their bear skin hat covers a bit of their mouth.

As we entered the Jewel House, we saw a display of



golden cutlery - spoons, knives, forks and even plates. They were bigger than my head! We saw 10 or 11 royal trumpets with decorated pieces of fabric attached with golden thread. None of us could ignore the magnificent St Edward's Crown (the King's crown). There are many different jewels on it, such as rubies, diamonds and emeralds.

Next, we visited the Battlements. We saw war cannons that were used to attack other invading countries during war. We also saw a small display of guns that looked quite old but they were in fact years old! I noticed that quite a lot of the artefacts we saw had the same symbol.

Finally, we got back on the coach and picked Kestrels up. With a sigh of relief and hunger, we went into the services and had the choice of KFC or Burger King for our dinner. After a long, eventful day, we arrived back at Hope Brook School where our parents picked us up to take us home.

Festival for children in Years 1-6.

Jamie Littler engaged well with his audience and showed them how to draw the character 'Cinder' who features in his new book 'Arkspire'. When we returned to school, the children had fun sketching 'Cinder' for themselves using the method he had shown them. During the visit, we bumped into the Gruffalo too! We managed to introduce ourselves and take a quick snapshot. What a super day!

On Tuesday 10 October, Woodpeckers had great fun at Cheltenham Literature Festival. We explored the Waterstones Children's Bookshop and listened to a story being read. We worked as a team to complete a Moomin Trail where we used clues to answer questions. We all got a sticker at the end as we answered all the questions correctly. Later on, as we were eating our lunch, we had a visit from the Gruffalo - we just had to take a

class photo! Finally, we got to enjoy the best part of our trip - a story and poem

session with Michael Rosen. We were all very excited when he performed one of our class favourites: 'Chocolate Cake'.

On Tuesday 10th October, Wagtails visited the Cheltenham Literature Festival. The children enjoyed an engaging workshop led by the authors; Dom Colon and A.F. Harrold where they provided an insight into their new poetry book called Welcome to Wild Town. The workshop was full of laughter as the authors read and imitated a range of poems from their book that related to a variety of animals that live in Wild Town.

After the workshop, the children explored different trails and book shops as well as having a class photo with the Gruffalo!

On Wednesday 11 October, with 1200 children in the audience, Kestrels class had an inspiring, lively talk by authors Phil Earle and Lesley Parr. They discussed how they had written their present and past books and what had inspired each oneincluding their pets and family members! Their most recent books are both historically based, Phil's being written in the war time - This was perfect inspiration - on return to school- for the writing of Kestrels own historical story based on an evacuee.









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# Wagtails Trip to The Dean Heritage Centre
